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Foreword

The present volume contains all the known extant keyboard compositions of two contemporaneous Italian composers, Annibale Padovano (ca. 1527–ca. 1575) and Sperindio Bertoldo (ca. 1530–1570). Both were connected with Padua, for Annibale was born in that city and Bertoldo worked there.

What is known of the life and works of Annibale il Padovano we owe to a monograph by Giacomo del Valle de Paz¹ and to Pierront and Hennebains's detailed introduction to their edition of Annibale's book of ensemble ricercari of 1556.²

Annibale was born in Padua ca. 1527. He was one of the organists of San Marco in Venice from 1552 to 1566, concurrently first with Parabosco and then with Merulo. After 1566 we find him in Graz as director of music to one of the Austrian archdukes. He probably remained there to the time of his death in 1575, possibly with occasional visits to other courts in southern Germany and Austria. Among his extant compositions, in addition to the present collection and the one mentioned in note 2, are a book of madrigals à 5 (1564); a book of motets (1567); and a book of masses (1573). The book here transcribed appeared after the composer's death with the following title³:
